School Self-Evaluation Report and Improvement Plan

1. Introduction

This document records the outcomes of our last improvement plan, the findings of this self-evaluation, and our current improvement plan, including targets and the actions we will implement to meet the targets.

1.1 Outcomes of our last improvement plan from November 2018 to June 2019

- Across classes form 3rd to 6th, there was a 7.35% increase in the average percentiles from Standardised Tests in the area of Comprehension.
- Over the course of the year, the school invested heavily in Guided Reading material along increasing the selection of class novels in the school. It is planned that a further expansion of the schools novel collection be undertaken in the 2019-2020 school year.

1.2 The focus of this evaluation

We undertook self-evaluation of teaching and learning during the period December 2019 to the end of January 2019. We evaluated the following aspect(s) of teaching and learning:

- The use of Gaeilge Neamhfhoirmiúil throughout the school.
- The opportunities for children to engage in Gaeilge Neamhfhoirmiúil both inside and outside the classroom.
- The confidence and competencies of children in their use of conversational Irish
- The feelings and opinions of teachers towards their current teaching of Gaeilge Neamhfhoirmiúil and possible opportunities to further develop their own teaching of Gaeilge Neamhfhoirmiúil.

2. Findings
